Remembrance Day

Kitchen Garden News

Busy green thumbs have been working hard during lessons getting the garden ready for the end of the year. Some beds have been completely emptied and refilled with compost, lucerne mulch and some smelly blood and bone so they have time to settle before the start of next year's classes.

A bumper crop of beetroot was harvested with some of the delicious bulbs as big as the children's heads! Lots of cherry tomatoes and yellow zucchini were also harvested and used by the cooks in their creations.

Preps and Years 2M and 2G made bruffins which were enjoyed by everyone. Many people have asked for the recipe so here it is:

- 12 slices of wholemeal bread, crusts removed and flattened.
- 12 eggs
- 2 Roma tomatoes sliced.
- 1 cup of chopped bacon (or you could use ham or smoked salmon.)
- Preheat oven to 190oC and grease a 12-hole muffin tray.
- Place one slice of bread into each muffin hole, press down to make a hollow.
- Divide bacon and tomatoes into bases.
- Crack one egg into each hole. Top with grated cheese if desired.
- Bake for 10-12 minutes until eggs are cooked to your liking.

Enjoy for breakfast or great cold in the lunch box.

Year 1 classes had a general garden tidy up and made some beetroot dip with crudities using the enormous beetroot they harvested.

There are only two weeks of school to go so that means party time in Kitchen Garden. Parents (and special friends/grandparents) are more than welcome to join us for this. Please let me know if you will be attending. For the Year 2 classes, this will be their last regular Kitchen Garden lesson and the first group of children to 'graduate' from the program.

Christmas holidays are within our sights...

Here are just a few reminders regarding end of year activities.

Lockers, books, locks, iPads

All Year 9s need to hand in their iPads on Friday of Week 8 (29 November).

For all Year 7 and 8, we will be updating student iPads over a 24 hour period in Week 8 and if all goes well, students will be able to take their iPads home for the holidays.

Textbooks need to be returned in Week 8 to the library. Families will be expected to pay for any books not returned.

Lockers will also be cleaned out and locks returned in this week. “Lest we forget” Reenactment

On the 11th day of the 11th month of this year our Year 9 students met on the battlefield of the GCCC oval to re-enact the Gallipoli landing of our ANZAC troops in 1915.

Armed with water pistols and water bombs the Year 9 “Turkish soldiers” defended the high ground, behind leafy barricades and cardboard defences. In an offensive back and forth, the opposing “ANZAC troops” equally armed attacked and retreated their way up the hill, around the barricades, at times taking territory for the Entente and at others retreating under heavy Alliance counter-attack.

Covered in superficial “wounds” (red food dye) and wet to the core, our young troops, having discussed the motives and outcomes of the battle sat back and enjoyed some delicious ANZAC biscuits and their choice of hot or iced tea – a slightly tastier post-battle treat than the troops themselves would have experienced.

Pause and Ponder - Volcanic Tempers

Volcanic eruptions are often described as angry, hot, explosive and as destructive as a nuclear explosion! A bad temper can also be described in some of the same terms - angry, explosive, hot, and destructive. It's not a flattering comparison. but an bad temper can feel as intense as a volcano when it is aimed directly at another person. The moment may be quickly over, but it can leave emotional devastation and bitter feelings behind.

It's sad that the people we love the most are often the target of our hurtful words. But even when we feel we've been provoked, we have a choice. Will we respond in anger or in kindness? The Bible tells us to rid ourselves of bitterness and anger, and to 'be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you.' (Ephesians 4:32).

If you are struggling with chronic anger that is hurting your relationships, surrender this vulnerable part of your emotions to Christ's strength (Philippians 4:13). Ask God to forgive you for an uncontrolled temper, to show you how to moderate your emotions and to honour others above yourself (Romans 12:10). Seek out help from others to learn how to deal with your strong emotions in appropriate ways. As we earnestly seek to love others and to please God, we can win the victory over a volcanic temper.
